+ Making Public Opinion Heard

World Wide Views on Global Warming has now happened, and a total of 4.000 citizens in 38 countries have shared their views on climate change and how a climate deal should be shaped at COP15, the UN Climate Conference in Copenhagen this December.

We want to thank everyone involved in this historic event: project managers and staff from our national partner organisations, sponsors, spokespersons, ambassadors, volunteers at the national meetings, and most of all, we want to thank the 4.000 citizens, who spent a day in September on deliberations on climate change and future climate policy.

The citizens' message to their politicians is clear: They should take fast and strong action at COP15. 91 % of the world's citizens find it urgent to reach a global climate deal at COP15. Furthermore, 89 % think that Annex 1 countries' short-term target for emission reductions should be 25-40% or higher. This target is remarkably higher than targets proposed by political decision-makers in the lead-up to COP15.

All WWViews partner organisations are now working on disseminating these clear and important messages. We want to spread the message as far as possible, and we therefore welcome all climate stakeholders, NGOs, politicians, journalists, scientists, and everyone else, who find it relevant, to make use of the WWViews results in their work.

The views of ordinary citizens should not be ignored. Therefore, we kindly encourage you to browse through the [results](#) and help us disseminate their messages in order to make sure that the views of the public will be present at the COP15 negotiations less than two months ahead of us.

In this issue of the WWViews newsletter you can read about the WWViews Policy Report and how to use the WWViews results. You can also watch video interviews with citizens who participated at the WWViews meetings on September 26; you can see the opening speech by Ms. Connie Hedegaard, Danish Minister of Climate and Energy, and we have made slideshows from the 44 WWViews meetings.

+ **The WWViews Policy Report**

'Urgency' is the most often-used expression from the many recommendations formulated by the 4.000 citizens on September 26, and 91 % of the citizens who participated, agree on this point. But though many of the results are easily interpreted, others are more intricate and demand a further level of analysis. Therefore, WWViews representatives are right now working on a compilation of the many results and recommendations from September 26. A compilation, which will end up as the official WWViews Policy Report.

This policy report will contain a short and precise executive summary listing the most important tendencies from the material. It will also provide an interpretation of the results and messages from September 26. Finally the report will present a clear description of the method regarding for example ways of recruitment along with a presentation of all partners and organizations that have been part of the project.

The Danish Board of Technology will distribute the report, so that all partners will be able to present it to their own national COP15 delegates and politicians on November 19, 2009. It is our intention that no negotiator shall reach Copenhagen in December without having heard about or seen the remarkable results of the World Wide Views On Global Warming.

+ **Citizen Interviews from Russia, Austria, Denmark, and Chile**

One thing is to organise a global citizen consultation; it is a whole other thing to actually participate in one! Many of the WWViews partner organisations has therefore made video interviews with citizens, who participated on September 26. The main focus of these interviews is the personal experience of these citizens: What is it like to participate in a global citizen consultation? And what are their personal recommendations for their COP15 delegates?
